St. Thomas More College Celebrates 75 Years: 1936-2011



Prehistory

THE YEAR 2011 MARKS 75 YEARS SINCE ST. THOMAS MORE

College (STM) was established as a Catholic college federated with the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon. The efforts involved in the founding of this institution called for faith, commitment and, most of all, a vision of Catholic higher education shared by both the Catholic community and the University. Such a common vision was not realized until 1936; thus St. Thomas More College had its beginnings at a most unlikely time, during the Great Depression of the 1930s in Saskatchewan.

Although their hope to have a Catholic college at the new provincial University of Saskatchewan had been publicly announced by Saskatoon Catholics as early as 1913, with an encouraging response from University President Walter Murray at that time, no real progress had been made for the next decade or so. In 1926, the Saskatoon Catholic lay men regrouped and decided to take up the college question again. They formed the Newman Society and were able to bring Toronto priest/scholar Dr. Basil Markle to Saskatoon to teach Scholastic Philosophy at the university and serve as chaplain to Catholic university students. Markle began his teaching and chaplaincy work in September 1926; the next year, the Newman Society purchased land on the edge of the campus and built a white house (Newman Hall), with living space for

Markle, a chapel, and Newman clubrooms for the students. With these encouraging developments, it had seemed that a Catholic college would soon follow, but it was to be another ten years before there would be the "meeting of the minds" needed for the project to go forward. Early in January 1936, the Saskatchewan bishops met with the Newman Society and gave their approval in principle; they stated strongly, however, that it would be "absolutely impossible, owing to present financial conditions," to go forward with the college plan at that time.

"Absolutely impossible" as it seemed, the long-awaited approval had been given and, within a matter of months, in spite of all practical considerations, the founding of the Catholic college was underway. By September, the first two Basilians had arrived in Saskatoon, the name "St. Thomas More College" had been placed over the door of the white house, and 39 students had registered through St. Thomas More College for the academic year 1936-37. In spring 1937, the first five STM graduates were awarded their BA degrees at the University of Saskatchewan convocation.

And the rest, as they say, is history . . .

January, 1936

The Bishops of Saskatchewan give approval in principle for the establishment of a Catholic college.

January to June, 1936

Negotiations are carried out by Basilian Superior General Henry Carr, csb and University President Walter Murray. Approvals are given by the University Senate and the Basilian Congregation for the founding of a Basilian Catholic federated college at the university – It's a go!

June, 1936

St. Thomas More is chosen as the college's name and patron saint . The name is quickly shortened to "STM."

August 21, 1936

The first two Basilians arrive in Saskatoon by train from Toronto and move into the white house.

September, 1936

The first classes are taught by St. Thomas More College faculty, using university classrooms.



1942

STM is accepted as a permanent foundation of the Congregation of St. Basil of Toronto (the Basilians).

1943

STM is incorporated by the Legislature of Saskatchewan.

1943

Growth requires construction of an addition to the white house.

1945

Basilian Fr. Joseph O'Donnell arrives at STM and forms Newman Drama/Newman Players.

1948-49

Ulcers Incorporated, a student-run cooperative lunch program, begins.

November 27, 1953

St. Thomas More College's *de facto* status as a federated college is officially recognized by the University of Saskatchewan.

April 18, 1954

STM celebrates the sodbreaking and blessing of the ground for the construction of a fieldstone building with chapel, auditorium/cafeteria, library, Basilian residence and offices.

1956

Liturgical art works by Lionel Thomas (mural, altar, stations of the cross, copper doors) and Robert Rambusch (stained glass windows) are installed in the chapel.

December 8, 1956

The first Mass is celebrated in the new STM chapel, dedicated to Mary, Queen of the Universe.

February 6-7, 1957

STM celebrates the blessing and grand opening of the new college building.

September, 1958

The first non-Basilian full-time faculty member is appointed, joining the seven Basilians on faculty that year.

1960s

1963-64

College construction phase 2 is carried out, adding facilities for the Shannon Library, cafeteria, boardroom, art gallery and student lounge (the Murray Room).

1963

Art works by Lionel Thomas are installed – a metal wall sculpture of Thomas More entitled "The Moment of Truth" and enamelled copper Arts and Sciences doors at the North entrance.

1967


The first non-Basilian tenured faculty members are invited to membership on the Corporation.

1968-69


College construction phase 3 is carried out, including faculty offices, classrooms and third floor faculty lounge (the Chelsea Room).

Sixth STM Principal

1971-72

Changes are made to STM governance structures, enabling Corporation expansion to include lay faculty, non-Catholics and non-Saskatchewan residents, plus formation of a Board of Governors.

1973

A Newman chaplaincy team is formed, including lay men and women in addition to designated Basilians.

1975

Michael Keenan is appointed STM's first Dean.

1976

STM celebrates its 40th Anniversary and Newman's 50th.

January, 1976

Prairie artist William Kurelek paints a mural on the North wall of the chapel and surrounding the 1956 Lionel Thomas mural. The Kurelek work is an anniversary gift to the college from the Saskatoon Basilians and the artist.

1980s

February 29, 1984

The official St. Thomas More College Coat of Arms and Crest are granted by the College of Arms of England. The crest includes the shield of Thomas More, the inset USask crest, and the October, 1987 STM motto, "Christ is our head."

1986-87

The college community celebrates Newman Centre's 60th and STM's 50th Anniversaries. with an Alumni Reunion Weekend in October and special events throughout the year.

October, 1986

Heartwood: A History of St. Thomas More College and the Newman Centre at the University of Saskatchewan is published.

1987

A conference on The Role of the Small College in Canadian Higher Education is hosted by STM.

The first annual Keenan Lecture is held in memory of Michael Keenan, STM's first Dean.

May, 1989

A Man for Our Season: An International Symposium on St. Thomas More is hosted by

The For all Seasons major fundraising campaign is launched.

1991

The Basilian Way of Life lecture series is hosted by STM.

1992

The first annual Distinguished Alumna and Alumnus Awards are presented.

1993

The first annual STM President's Dinner is held and St. Thomas More Award presented.

1995

STM's student residence, Ogle Hall, is opened (operated until 2011).

1996

In Medias Res, a liberal arts journal, is launched by STM.

1999

The Prairie Centre for the Study of Ukrainian Heritage (PCUH) is established.

1999

The President's Dinner honours the Basilian Fathers who served at St. Thomas More College over the years.

2000s

2001

Newman Centre celebrates its 75th Anniversary with a reunion of former Newman Glee Club and Choir members.

2002

The first annual STM President's Gala is held.

2003-2005

Renovations include updates to the Father Joseph O'Donnell Auditorium, art gallery, cafeteria, Murray Room, Shannon Library, classrooms, offices and meeting spaces.

2003

A Father Henry Carr Symposium and a conference on the Future of Catholic Higher Education in Canada are hosted by STM.

2003

The on-line catalogue of Shannon Library is integrated with the University Library catalogue.

December, 2005

The Engaged Learning Program and Intercordia are launched, thanks to a generous donation from Les and Irene Dubé.

2010

STM's proposed Minor in Catholic Studies is approved by the University Council, with the first course, Introduction to Catholicism, offered in January. St. Thomas More College will nurture its identity as a Catholic liberal arts college and fulfill its calling as an exemplary embodiment of the Catholic intellectual tradition in Canada.


