ENGLISH

(Choose 3 – 6 credits of 100 level ENG)

LANGUAGES

SOCIOLOGY

Sociology is the study of modern society. These courses will help you develop research skills, critical thinking skills, and writing skills which are very important for admission tests (e.g. MCAT, DAT, Pharmacy Critical Skills Essay, etc.). These two 100-level courses are also prerequisites for the upper year health related courses you may wish to take. We recommend that students take one of these classes in each term of first year.

PSYCHOLOGY

PSY 120 gives an introduction to neuroscience, memory, and understanding the brain. While, PSY 121 includes an introduction to psychological disorders, treatment, mental health, stress, and coping. PSY 121 is a prerequisite for PSY 207.3 Psychology of Death and Dying, PSY 213.3 Child Development, PSY 223.3 Abnormal Psychology, and many other upper year courses that may interest pre-med students. Students who are interested in a Health Studies major are required to take both PSY 120 and PSY 121.
